The Secret of Successful Living—Fruit Bearing By Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me" (John 15:1-40).

There are at least three things you can do with your life. Firstly, you can waste it.

This is depicted in the parable of the Prodigal Son. Jesus said, "Not long after that, the younger son got together all he had, set off for a distant country and there squandered his wealth in wild living" (Luke 15:13). He wasted his life. Secondly, you can spend it. In the parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31). Jesus said, "The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried. In hell. where he was in torment, he looked up and saw Abraham faraway, with Lazarus by his side" (verses 22-23). Lazarus, though poor materially, had obviously made the right investments whilst the rich man made only earthly investments without considering that one day he would meet his Maker who would ask him what he did with his life. Jesus said, "But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy. and where thieves do not break in and steal" (Matthew 6:20). Thirdly, you can invest it. In the parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30), Jesus commended the two servants who put the talents given to them to work and gained more. The tremendous spiritual truth in this parable is that you are to be a faithful

steward of all your God-given talents.



You must decide how you want to live your life.

The secret to living a fruitful life is to know your God-given identity—who you are and why you are here.

That was Jesus' secret of success. Jesus knew why He came, where He came from and where He was going. "Jesus knew that the time had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father...Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God" (John 13:1, 3). Similarly, knowing who you are as a Christian and your reason for

being will help you lead a fruitful life. In chapter 15 of the Gospel of John, Jesus used a picture of a branch to describe a Christian because it typifies the Christian's identity in relation to Jesus Christ, the Vine. You are a branch and you are here to bear fruit.

Understanding the following four facts about the branch will help you lead a fruitful life.

Firstly, the branch is dependent. It is of the vine but it is not the vine. You, as a Christian, are dependent on Christ. You must draw from His life,

Brother Adrian shared a devotional thought with us.


12.30pm




intercessors and those helping with parking facilities. Only in heaven will we be able to see the far-reaching effects of all this commitment!



The Men and Women combine their prayers

Something powerful happens when the people of God pray. On Saturday, 30 November 2002, 125 men and women set aside time to worship and to seek the Lord corporately at the Combined Men's and Women's Prayer Rally. Senior Associate Pastor Petrina Guneratnam shared some thoughts on prayer that afternoon. She turned our attention towards Jesus, a great example of one


who prayed. "Jesus recognised the importance of prayer," she said. He rose early to pray—a sacrifice that He made in order to seek the Father.

Jesus certainly understands what it is to have a demanding schedule.

Multitudes daily came to hear Him and to be healed by Him (Luke 5:15-16).

Jesus knew that without communion with God, He would be "running on empty". The signs and wonders that He did were preceded by prayer. Pastor Petrina shared an interesting observation of the way Jesus prayed. He spent much time praying long prayers to the Father in private but His prayers in public were very short. She noted that these days, many do the reverse!

Besides praying alone, Pastor
Petrina emphasised the importance of
praying with our families and with others.
Prayer strengthens relationships. She
illustrated this with a diagram of a
triangle with God on the top and various
combinations of people forming the
base. She pointed out that as these,
husbands and wives, parents and
children, siblings, relatives, friends,



became so severe that he could not sleep at night. He went for a medical check-up but they could not find anything wrong with him. The pain persisted and finally at the advice of Church friends, he went to the "Institut"

Darshan shared that his life has changed as a result of what he went through. He used to put God second but now, God comes first in his life. He had been smoking for more than 30 years and could not give up the habit but this

employers and employees, moved closer to God through prayer, they would automatically move closer to each other.

She concluded with a reminder that prayerlessness is not a weakness but a sin because it is telling God that we can live our lives independently without His help.

Darshan Singh Sidhu and his wife Mekand encouraged us with a wonderful testimony of what God can do in our families though the power of prayer. Mekand was in Australia with her children when she had a dream that Darshan was very ill and knew that she had to go home immediately. Back in Malaysia, Darshan was experiencing pain in his arm in April. The pain

Jantung Negara" (IJN). While they were doing the angiogram, his breathing stopped and he vomitted blood. He was afraid and thought that his time was up. He was unconscious for two days and when he woke up and saw his children Jack and Pam, he thought there must be something very wrong with him for them to fly back from Australia. He was scared as the three patients in the ward with him did not make it. He prayed to the Lord to give him a second chance. God heard his prayer and the prayers of the many who prayed for him. By the time he went for the heart by-pass operation in July, he was not afraid. He thanked God that he recovered very fast!

time God has helped him to stop smoking. He calculated that he spent about RM42,000 on cigarettes and he had to spend another RM43,000 to recover his health! Now, he tells people not to smoke. Mekand had been praying for many years for Darshan and she thanked God that He answered her prayers.

The choir made up of members of the Men's and Women's Ministries sang aptly, "Join your hands with mine, let our faith combine for in prayer there is nothing impossible..." Indeed, God works miracles when His people pray.



Sin and salvation

"Man was created good and upright; for God said, 'Let us make man in our own image, after our likeness.' However, man by voluntary transgression fell and thereby incurred not only physical death but also spiritual death, which is separation from God."

"Salvation is received through repentance toward God and faith toward the Lord Jesus Christ. By the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost, being justified by grace through faith, man becomes an heir of God, according to the hope of eternal life."

Sin has a bad name. Even using the word seems to imply ignorance and bigotry in contemporary culture. It's fine for an individual to have strong feelings about values, but it is definitely not fine to "impose" those preferences on others.

Despite these objections, moral sensitivity does seem to be hardwired into the human soul. While no culture has cornered the market on personal standards, every person has the ability to sense when things are not right. Anyone who did not believe that on September 10 was converted on September 11. Individuals who lose this ability are considered sociopaths. Sin is for real.

Three realities of sin

To appreciate how God can rescue us from this force, we need to understand what it is and what it does. Three complementary views of sin help us grasp the scope of its destructive nature.

Legal: Sin as crime. God has established certain "laws" of conduct (e.g., the Ten Commandments) and we commit sin by disobeying them. In this sense, transgressing God's law is a spiritual "crime" that incurs punishment. This may be the most widely held view both inside and outside the church.

Indeed, we have all "fallen short" of the character of God (Romans 3:23). The Bible uses the metaphor of sheep to describe us as wayward and self-willed. And that's the point—my stepping over the boundaries God has provided for my welfare and peace of mind says that I have decided to replace Him as the sovereign of my

life. One commentator describes this as living as though God does not exist. The offense is not just in the deed, but in the rebellion it represents. Our deeds reveal who we are, fallen beings mired in selfishness and exploitation.

Relational: Sin as alienation. The peace and joy that flow from knowing God intimately are simply unavailable when we demand control of our lives. This breakdown with our Heavenly Father distances us from Him and makes the human race the ultimate dysfunctional family.

Jesus illustrated this with a story about a young man who demanded his inheritance prematurely and used it to abandon his family for a life of self-gratification (Luke 15:11-32). With everything he could ever want in hand, he walked away, preferring control over a pittance to a fortune gained by loyalty.

Alienation leads to deprivation. The young man started off feasting with rented friends but ultimately found himself feeding with the pigs. Eventually the consequences of our separation from God will catch up with us as well. If I refuse to be reconciled to Him, He will allow my condition to become permanent in the form of eternal separation.

Volitional: Sin as slavery. The selfcentered life promises freedom but delivers the opposite. One of the most destructive aspects of sin is its ability to dominate us, to take away our choices, our volition.

Sin is much more than discrete deeds such as holding up a convenience store. The Bible also describes it as a dark force that controls our hearts and reinforces our selfishness. In its most overt forms, it manifests itself as addiction, violence or injustice. Paul describes this bondage in stark terms: "The sinful mind is hostile to God. It does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. Those controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God" (Romans 8:7,8). Ironically, the more I grasp for freedom, the stronger the chains that bind me. Sin and self-centeredness feed on each other.

If sin can be an act of transgression against God, a state of alienation from God, and a form of spiritual slavery, where do we turn for hope? The good news of the gospel is that there is salvation larger than our sin!

Three realities of salvation

God's love for us is so profound that He simply refuses to abandon us in this condition. We can know this because He sent His Son Jesus to bring us "salvation" in many forms.

Let off: Salvation as pardon. Sin and judgment have a cause and effect relationship. In His mercy, the Father sent Jesus to pay the price for all our violations of His divine law. First John 2:1,2 describes Him as "the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world."

By dying on the cross as a substitute for us, Jesus has made it possible for God to extend a full pardon to all those who trust in Him.

This is the essence of forgiveness. God supplies it by grace, giving us what we need rather than what we deserve. We receive this gift by giving up on our self-governance (repenting) and reaching out to God with whatever faith we have. Any believing heart will find forgiveness in God through Christ.

Coming home: Salvation as reconciliation. Our Heavenly Father recognizes that personal alienation is a recipe for heartbreak. He is grieved by the distance we maintain from Him, and, like the father who was deserted by his son in Jesus' story, God longs for us to return home.

The wayward son's road trip did not prove to be permanent. He came to his senses and returned home. Instead of confrontation, his father ran to meet the son, clothed him, fed him, and invited the rest of the family to celebrate his return. Alienation was at an end!

It also ends in Christ. Faith in Jesus allows the Father to "adopt" us into His family as His own sons and daughters (Ephesians 1:5). Even our alienation from other people can be healed in Christ as He becomes "our peace, who has made the two one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing in his flesh the law with its commandments and regulations"

(Ephesians 2:14,15a). On the cross, Jesus demolished the walls of human alienation as well as the sin barrier that separated us from our Father in heaven. When my faith meets God's grace, He receives me with the same joy as the father who welcomed home his rebellious son.

Set Free: Salvation as deliverance.

All of the things we do to take control of our lives, to gratify our wants, are subtle forms of slavery. These bondages are so severe that rescuing ourselves from them is impossible. The power of sin is so great that Paul cried out, "What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death?" (Romans 7:24).

He went on to answer his own question: "Thanks be to God—through Jesus Christ our Lord! ... Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 7:25 through 8:2).

Jesus has come to break the power of every kind of darkness that holds the human heart captive. In Christ, God "has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves" (Colossians 1:13). Jesus' death on the cross has broken the power of sin and His resurrection has provided us a new life of freedom and peace.

Pardon releases us from the guilt of sinful deeds. Reconciliation restores our broken relationship with God and others. Deliverance frees us from bondage to sin's power. All of this is possible because of the Cross and is available to us by faith. "How shall we escape if we ignore such a great salvation?" (Hebrews 2:3).



strength and abilities just like the branch whose survival hinges on the vine. Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10). Paul said, "I can do everything through him who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13).

Secondly, the branch has the ability to receive the nutrients from the vine and the responsibility to use and give what it receives. You, as the branch, can receive what Jesus, the Vine, supplies. Jesus said, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me, you can do nothing" (John 15:5).

Thirdly, the branch is a beneficiary. Everything that the branch has is an inheritance. The branch has no ability to do anything on its own. Similarly, the Christian inherits blessings and gifts. The Bible says, "Praise to God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ" (Ephesians 1:3). Your inheritance is not based on merit but on your relationship with Jesus Christ. You are heirs and joint-heirs with Christ (Romans 8:17). Through Christ, you have the power to become everything you can be. You are the beneficiary of His blessings. Paul says in Philippians 4:19, "And my God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus."

Fourthly, the success of the branch is from the vine. The vine promotes and gives the branch success and victory. The apostle Paul said, "But by the grace of God, I am what I am, and his grace to me was not without effect. No, I worked harder than all of them—yet not I, but the grace of God that was with me" (1 Corinthians 15:10). Paul recognised that he was a branch and that when he yielded to the Vine, he experienced success and victory by the grace of God.

The purpose of the branch is to bear fruit. A Christian who has a strong relationship with Jesus, the Vine, will bear the following fruits:

1. The fruit of holiness

Holiness is the beauty and character of God displayed in your daily life. "But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves to God, the benefit you reap

leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life" (Romans 6:22). You do not produce it on your own. If you do, you are producing the piety of the Pharisees (Matthew 5:20).

There are two aspects to holiness—negative and positive. The negative aspect speaks of purification—putting off the Adamic nature. "Since we have these promises, dear friends, let us purify ourselves from everything that contaminates body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for God" (2 Corinthians 7:1). "But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these; anger, rage, malice, slander and filthy language from your lips. Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator" (Colossians 3:8-10).

The positive aspect speaks of what a Christian can and must do." Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience" (Colossians 3:12). Holiness is to the inner man what wealth is to the outer man. If holiness is only found on the outside, it is hypocrisy. God has invested His holiness in you. You need to work it out and become what He wants you to be. Be a branch and bear what the Vine is capable of producing through you.

2. The fruit of godly Christian character

The branch depends on the Vine to produce godly Christian character. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. Against such things there is no law" (Galatians 5:22-23). The world has substitutes for these fruits. They may have happiness but they do not know the joy of the Holy Spirit. They may be able to sleep (with medication) but they do not have peace. Jesus says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14:27). They have lust (eros) but they do not know Agape love. You are the branch and when you rely on Jesus, the Vine, you will be able to produce the fruit of the Spirit.

Paul says, "Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyednot only in my presence, but now much more in my absence—continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose. Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure, children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine like stars in the universe" (Philippians 2:12-15).

3. The fruit of giving

The fruit tree never gets to eat its own fruit. Instead, others eat of the fruit. As the branch, you will be a blessing and a witness to others. The early Church was a giving church. "All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as they had need" (Acts 2:44-45). No wonder the Church grew rapidly.

4. The fruit of praise, testimony and thanksgiving

When you worship God and testify of His goodness, you are bearing the fruit of praise and you become His witness. This is the life of the branch. The Bible says, "... therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise—the fruit of lips that confess his name" (Hebrews 13:15). The Holy Spirit will empower you to live this kind of life. "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

Do you know your identity? You are the branch and Jesus is the Vine. Life in Christ will bear fruits. Let us be fruit-bearing believers.


