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The Secret to Fruit Bearing Is Abiding By Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam

"Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.... If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you" (John 15:4, 7).

The secret of successful living is knowing your God-given identity—who you are and the purpose for living. In chapter 15 of the Gospel of John, Jesus spoke of the Vine and the branch. The branch describes the Christian's relationship to Jesus Christ, the Vine. You are the branch and you are to bear fruit such as the fruit of holiness, godly character, giving, witnessing and worship. This truth was addressed or dealt with in the previous issue of the Calvary News.

Now then, knowing the secret of successful living, what is the secret to fruit bearing? The secret to fruit bearing is abiding. The word "abide" or "remain" is mentioned eight times in verses one to eight in chapter 15 of the Gospel of John. Jesus emphasised that as long as you abide in Him, you will be fruitful. There is tremendous power in abiding. What then is abiding and how does one abide? When you confess and repent of your sins and acknowledge Jesus as your Saviour and Lord, you are united with Jesus. However, being united with Jesus does not guarantee communion with Him. There ought to be dependence and fellowship on a day to day basis. It is a two-way relationship where there is giving and receiving. He is the Vine and you are the branch. As the branch, you do not have to struggle to bear fruit. His life will flow in you and His life will produce His fruits in your life.

There is a distinction between spiritual and carnal or natural fruits. Sometimes, the natural

characteristics of a person can be mistaken for the spiritual. For

instance, some, by nature, never get ruffled, disturbed or shocked easily. They are able to keep their cool and remain calm even under crises. This does not necessarily mean that they have the fruit of the Spirit found in verses 22 and 23 of chapter five of Galatians. There are also people who seem to be happy all the time whether it rains or shines. They are simply "happy-go-lucky" by nature. Do not be mistaken about these natural traits and conclude that this person is abiding in Christ.

How do you know if the fruit is of a spiritual nature? You cannot produce spiritual fruits on your own. It is beyond your ability. However, when you experience it, you will recognise that it is something that comes from divine enablement, from the indwelling power of the Holy Spirit. The purpose of the fruit will always be godly in nature. When others taste the fruit produced by the Holy Spirit, they will recognise God's work in your life and know that you depended on and had fellowship with God.

After highlighting the main criteria for the land that the Church needs, he informed those present that a suitable parcel of land had been located in Bukit Jalil, next to the Bukit Jalil Golf & Country Resort.

After the resolution to give approval to the Board of deacons to purchase the aforementioned property had been moved and seconded, Senior Pastor gave opportunities for questions. The resolution was put to vote by a show of hands. It was overwhelmingly supported by the majority and thus Senior Pastor declared that the resolution was adopted! Using 1 John 3:18 encouraging us to love in word and in



deed and the parable of the Good Samaritan, Senior Pastor challenged those present to pray that many will respond in giving to help the Church purchase the land.

16 Foundational Truths Series The Holy Spirit Can Change Your Life

"All believers are entitled to and should ardently expect and earnestly seek the promise of the Father, the baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian Church. With it comes the enduement of power for life and service, the bestowment of the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry."

"The baptism of believers in the Holy Ghost is witnessed by the initial physical sign of speaking with other tongues as the Spirit of God gives them utterence."

"Sanctification is an act of separation from that which is evil, and dedication unto God."

Baptism in the Holy Spirit makes a difference. Peter, the gifted but often impetuous and sometimes undependable disciple of Jesus, is a good example. Disheartened by the arrest and impending conviction of Jesus, Peter denied the Lord three times (John 18:15-18, 25-27). But a few weeks later, Peter was baptized in the Holy Spirit and radically changed (Acts 2:4). Then he courageously stood before a confused and skeptical crowd and preached one of the great sermons of all time, winning 3,000 to Christ (Acts 2:41).

Indeed, the Bible teaches that the baptism in the Holy Spirit is a vital experience for all Christians.

Mark's Gospel quotes John the Baptist: "I baptize you with water, but he [Jesus] will baptize you with the Holy Spirit" (Mark 1:8, NIV). Each of the other three Gospel writers takes up the same promise using similar language (Matthew 3:11; Luke 3:16; John 1:33). Just before His ascension. Jesus personally assured His disciples, "For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 1:5), a promise dramatically fulfilled in 120 believers on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4). After Pentecost, Peter encouraged the awestruck crowd, "Repent and be baptized. ... And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off" (Acts 2:38,39).

Baptism in the Holy Spirit

Baptism in the Spirit is described in several ways. John the Baptist and Jesus spoke of "baptizing" in the Spirit (Mark 1:8; Acts 1:5). Jesus also described it as "power from on high" (Luke 24:49). Luke referred to being "filled" with the Spirit (Acts 2:4). Peter called it the "gift" of the Spirit (Acts 2:38). In other passages, the Spirit "fell" (Acts 10:44; 11:15, KJV), people "received" the Spirit (Acts 10:47; 19:2), the Spirit was "poured out" (Acts 10:45), and the Spirit "came" (Acts 19:6). The terms are most often verbs that stress the purpose, power and activity of the Spirit.

Since a number of biblical words are used for this overwhelming encounter with the Spirit, it is important to select one for our

doctrinal statements that enables us to accurately communicate the

biblical reality. The verb "to baptize" (Greek, *baptizo*) was prominent on the lips of Jesus and His followers. It is an intensive form of the word *bapto* that meant "to dip in or under," i.e., "to immerse." *Bapto* was often used for dyeing cloth where it is necessary to totally immerse the fabric in the dye. "Baptism in the Holy Spirit" has rich biblical precedent and a striking sense of immersion to describe a powerful encounter with the Holy Spirit.

The Promise of the Father

"I am going to send you what my Father has promised," Jesus told His disciples (Luke 24:49, NIV). Jesus could have referenced any number of Old Testament teachings on the Holy Spirit, who often came to energize people for God's service. For example, God put His Spirit on 70 elders to equip them as leaders under Moses. When the Spirit came on them, they prophesied (Numbers 11:25,26). "I wish that all the Lord's people were prophets and that the Lord would put his Spirit on them!" was Moses' own prophetic response (Numbers 11:29). Through Ezekiel, God promised, "I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws" (Ezekiel 36:27). Still later, Joel prophesied, "And afterward,

Everyone's A Winner

Even from the time of the registration, the children knew that **Vacation Bible School (VBS)** 2002 was going to be different. How does one begin a new year? Some make resolutions to live a better life. Some just carry on from the old without thinking much about what lies ahead. When we sin, Dr Wangai said that God should strike us dead but because of His great grace and mercy, we are not immediately consumed. Sadly, as we continue in our sins, we often do not even realise that the Lord has left us as He did in the case of Samson. He warned us not

On the first night, Dr Wangai related the story of Samson found in the book of Judges. Samson was born to Manoah and his wife who was childless until the angel of the Lord told her that she would conceive a son. Samson was to keep the Nazirite vow. He was not to drink wine or fermented drink, not to eat anything unclean and not to cut his hair as he was set apart to God.

But Samson was soon to break these vows. As Dr Wangai related the incidents that brought Samson's downfall, we had our first taste of his story-telling skills. He told the tales vividly and we could just see Samson killing the lion, eating the honey from the unclean carcass and allowing himself to be tricked by Delilah into revealing the secret of his great strength.

Samson's strength was not really in his hair but in his loyalty to God. When we sacrifice our lovalty to God, we relinquish His blessings. Dr Wangai urged us to search our hearts. Are we playing with sin and addicted to sin? He said, "You can cheat some people some of the time but you cannot cheat God anytime." God gave Samson a second chance and we read today that he is included among the giants of faith found in Hebrews.

That night, the altar was open to those who recognised that sin had entered their hearts and wanted to honour God once again with their lives.

When Senior Pastor Prince Guneratnam took out a hammer, broke the pot to pieces and then brought out a larger and more beautiful glazed pot, understanding dawned. Unless we break the existing "mould", we would not be able to get a new and larger "mould". Senior Pastor had made his point clearly. Head, Heart, Hands

good works and charitable deeds. She asked those who attended the "Morning Tea with Dr Mary Wangai" on Saturday, 11 January 2003 what they were known for in their community?



She encouraged them to use their talents to be a positive influence for Jesus.

She stressed the importance of prayer and abiding in Christ if they wanted to bear fruit for Jesus and to make an impact on their community.

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I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions" (Joel 2:28).

Even in the Old Testament, the coming of the Spirit was expected to be an empowering experience with visible personal and public results.

The Old Testament expectation included a powerful inner orientation to love and obey God. In addition, it especially anticipated a prophetic quickening of the speech of the people of God.

The Day of Pentecost

The immediate fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies, as well as those of John the Baptist and Jesus, came on the Day of

Pentecost. There suddenly came a sound like wind and the appearance of fire, reminiscent of God's mighty acts of old (Acts 2:1-3; Exodus 19:18). All 120 believers "were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them" (Acts 2:4). They immediately began to declare "the wonders" of God" in the various languages of their hearers that they had never learned (Acts 2:11). It was this mystery of praising God in other tongues that Peter unraveled for the skeptical crowd: "This is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: 'In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and your daughters will prophesy'" (Acts 2:16,17). Baptism in the Spirit, with speaking in other tongues either stated or implied, occurred over and over again in the Early Church as the biblical record makes clear (Acts 4:31; 8:17,18; 9:17; 10:44-46; 11:15; 19:6; 1 Corinthians 12:10,28; 13:1; 14:5,18,27; Ephesians 5:18,19).

True to the promises of the Old and New Testaments, these early believers were transformed into powerful witnesses as the Lord had promised (Acts 1:8). Led by the apostles who were personally trained by Jesus, ordinary men and women received not only the baptism in the Spirit but they also began to manifest the gifts of the Spirit required for powerful witness of word and deed. In one generation, with powerful witness, preaching and "signs following" (Mark 16:20, KJV) they carried the gospel of Christ to the known world.

Our Doctrine

We seek to maintain the biblical emphasis on Spirit baptism. We believe one should be "born again "

believe one should be "born again," or "regenerated" by the Spirit (John 3:3,5; Titus 3:5). We also believe one should be baptized in the Spirit. Baptism in the Spirit is distinct from and subsequent to the new birth. Such subsequence may, of course, be momentary and hardly noticeable as in the case of Cornelius' household (Acts 10:44-46), or it may be more obvious as in the case of the Samaritan and Ephesian believers (Acts 8:14-17; 19:1-7).

Initial Evidence

The Old Testament makes it clear that the Holy Spirit gives inspired speech, which He often uses to signal His presence (Numbers 11:25.26: 1 Samuel 10:10). In the New Testament, when the Spirit baptized believers, they spoke with other tongues (glossolalia), the presence of which was taken to be a sign of their baptism in the Spirit (Acts 2:4: 9:17: [see 1 Corinthians 14:18] 10:46; 19:6) and a sign of God's salvation to all nations (Acts 2:5-11). Peter's Jewish companions recognized that the Spirit had baptized Cornelius' household when "they heard them speaking in tongues and praising God" (Acts 10:46). Thus we have understood that, then and now, speaking in tongues is the initial physical evidence of baptism in the Holy Spirit. Obviously, further evidence of the Spirit's fullness must follow in godly living and effective service.

Power to Witness

Prominent in God's purposes for Spirit baptism is the equipping of believers for witness to Christ. Jesus instructed His disciples, "Stay in the city [Jerusalem] until you have been clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49) and added, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Power for witness also flows from the Spirit's gifts (charismata) for the work of the ministry (1 Corinthians 12:7-11); Romans 12:6-8; Ephesians 4:7-13; 1 Peter 4;10,11).

Progressive Sanctification

While baptism in the Spirit is not primarily for personal sanctification, it is an encounter with the Holy Spirit who has an important role in progressively bringing believers to godliness and maturity through His power to crucify ungodly impulses (Romans 8:13) and cultivate moral virtues, the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22,23).

For early believers, Christian faith without a powerful consciousness of the Spirit's baptizing power would have been incomprehensible. Thus, Assemblies of God founders taught, "All believers are entitled to and should ardently expect and earnestly seek the promise of the Father, the baptism in the Holy Ghost and fire, according to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Some think that to abide, you do not do anything. You just yield or surrender. To abide then, is to be like a glove. All the glove has to do is to allow the hand in the glove to do whatever it likes or wants. The hand represents Jesus who does whatever He wants with you. The glove does nothing except surrender! This is a misconception and is not totally correct. As a glove, you are passive and without will, just like a robot being controlled by another. You are denying the person God made you to be. This is a very dangerous way to live. God does not ask you to be a robot nor did He make you one. However, there is a certain amount of truth about the glove and hand illustration in the area of yielding and abandoning oneself to God-in that you make the choice to do so. It is your will to do the will of God in your life.

Abiding is not passive. It involves yielding and an act of your will. As you yield and will to do the will of God, God enables you. When you obey and do as He instructs you, God works through you. Paul said, "Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed—not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and act according to his good purpose" (Philippians 2:12-13). Abiding is two fold. You make a choice to obey the will of God and God will work in you. This gives you the strength to do the will of God. Your obedience to God's will produces the fruit of the Spirit.

Confession is necessary in abiding. Iniquities will hinder your communion with God. "But your iniquities have separated you from your God; your sins have hidden his face from you, so that he will not hear" (Isaiah 59:2). Confess your sins and be cleansed. Make sure nothing hinders or breaks your relationship with God. It is important that you come before Him in earnest confession. God sees your heart. There must be true repentance-what you say must correspond with what is in your heart. "If we claim to have fellowship with him yet walk in darkness, we lie and do not live by the truth" (1 John 1:6).

Abiding is also praying and meditating on the Word of God. The Word of God reveals the will of God. "This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us" (1 John 5:14). The better you know the Word, the better you pray. Learn to meditate on the Scriptures. This involves not just reading the Word but reflecting and thinking about what it is saying to you. Jesus said, "If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you" (John 15:7). Take time to come before God in prayer but be careful that you do not approach Him demanding, "Give me! Give me! Give me!" The best posture to come before God is as a humble servant seeking His will by asking Him to remove anything that will hinder your communion with Him and expressing your willingness to obey Him. In the Bible, you will find many wonderful examples of people yielding themselves to God, some with tears, some in sackcloth and some who waited before God with fasting. Some seek God for hours without asking for anything but just desiring God. They become people that produce a hundred, sixty and thirty fold to the glory of God (Matthew 13:8) and "Thus, by their fruit you will recognize them" (Matthew 7:20).

The secret of successful living is to be a fruit-bearing believer and to bear fruits, you need to abide in Jesus. Are you abiding? You can to-day!
